MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF

On behalf of the men and women of the Cambridge Police Department, I am pleased to present the 2017 Cambridge Police Department Annual Report. It is my hope that is Report provides the reader with accurate information regarding overall crime statistics and can serve as a resource tool for years to come.

The Cambridge Police Department was a Department that was in motion at the highest rank in 2017, with the resignation of Chief Daniel Dvorak in April and the appointment of Major Mark Lewis to Acting Chief of Police. Acting Chief Lewis retired after 30 years of service at the end of November, 2017. I was fortunate enough to be appointed by the Mayor and Council as Interim Chief of Police in December 2017, until a new Chief is named.

The Police Department focused on a strong Community Policing programs in 2017 with continuing efforts in areas such as D.A.R.E., the Citizen's Police Academy, Shop with a Cop, and numerous contacts with our City's youth and senior citizens. A new program, the Cambridge Police Department Explorer program, was offered and provides a positive influence for young people interested in a career in law enforcement. An emphasis was placed in the downtown shopping district for a more visible police presence, and this was enhanced by the placement of a uniformed foot patrolman permanently patrolling businesses and parking areas. Often the officer could be seen interacting with the public and business owners while on patrol, thus supporting the downtown and deterring crime.

In an effort to curtail open air drug trafficking in area neighborhoods, the Cambridge Police Department's Criminal Investigation Division conducted a large scale undercover drug operation utilizing a Cambridge Police Officer posing as a drug buyer. This program was assisted by the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms (ATF), and the Dorchester County Narcotics Task Force. To date, twenty-six arrests have been made for drug distribution and related charges. Operations such as this not only helps the community by removing drug sellers



from the area, but makes the streets safer for all residents who have to encounter this activity on a daily basis.

During the preparation of this Annual Report, two items of note were recognized and were worthy of highlighting:

- 1) During the 2017 year in review, Cambridge Police Officers drew their Taser weapon in critical incident situations fifteen times and deployed the cartridge nine times. In each instance the suspect either complied with the Officer's demands or submitted after the Taser was deployed. This is noted because the Taser is the last weapon in the force continuum the Officer has before the firearm is drawn and may be used against a suspect. It clearly shows restraint and proper training which is vital to policing today.
- 2) As we all know, the opioid crisis has become a national epidemic due to the number of deaths and related factors involved. Cambridge Police officers have been trained in the administration of Naloxone or "Narcan" as many area law enforcement agencies have, and officers carry the opioid reversing first aid equipment with them on patrol. In 2017, the Cambridge Police Department responded to 32 opioid overdoes, 10 of which proved to be fatal. In the remaining 22 non-fatal cases, officers administered "Narcan" 15 times where they determined the overdose victim to be in a critical state. In these cases, the victim was revived by our officers and turned over to Emergency Medical Services personnel or the victim refused treatment.

I find it noteworthy to recognize to the Cambridge Police Department's Criminal Investigation Division for their exemplary work performance in 2017. The Division is comprised of a Sergeant, Corporal, and five Detectives, two who are assigned to drug investigation units. In 2017, 474 cases were assigned to the Division for further investigation and of those cases 368 were closed by arrest or other means determined by the FBI's Uniformed Crime Reporting



System. This places the Division with a closure rate of 76 %, which is extremely high considering the national average is 47% for Part 1 crimes.



ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Crime Control

In 2017 the Cambridge Police Department realized a very large reduction in crimes against person in areas of murder, rape, and robbery. As mentioned previously Officers from the Criminal Investigation Division also realized a large increase in the number of cases solved or closed well above the national average for similar cases as such. Increases were noted in areas of burglary and theft, and those increases appear to be the result of small "Crime Sprees" where one or two individuals would enter homes or cars and steal property over a short period of time causing spikes in overall crime. Thankfully these people were arrested in most cases, and in one particular theft spree two subjects were arrested and charged for entering and stealing property from 33 vehicles.

Special Events

In 2017, the Cambridge Police Department developed or participated in the following special events:

Community Policing

The Community Policing Unit is comprised of a Sergeant and two Officers who oversee Drug Abuse Resistance Education (DARE), multiple Neighborhood Watch Groups, and various community service presentations and programs. They also assisted with:

Transported 40 children to Easton for the 11th Annual Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Basketball Tournament.

Participated in the National Night Out event by organizing Cambridge's event at the county pool.

Assisted at the Bradford House food bank event and helped distribute over 6,000 pounds of food to senior citizens.

Began the first Cambridge Police Explorer Cadet program with five Explorer Cadets.

Organized and participated the 2nd annual Cops on Roof Tops fund raising event at Dunkin Doughnuts for Special Olympics.

Organized both the Truck or Treat Halloween program and Shop with a Cop for Christmas.

Participated with Wal-Mart to provide and deliver 20 Thanksgiving dinners to families with each dinner providing food for 7 to 10 people.

Continued multiple visits to Pleasant Day, Mallard Bay, and the Bradford House to interact with senior citizens.









PART 1 CRIME - DISTRICT 1









PART 1 CRIME - DISTRICT 2 South of Washington Street from Teal Lane to Woods Road









High Street, across Ocean Gateway to Bucktown Road






OTHER DATA

Emergency Petitions are the process by which we encounter a person who may be threat to themselves or others and refuses medical treatment. We complete the petition and transport the individual to the hospital for evaluation. This is a very time consuming process for our officers and has been steadily increasing since 2013.



Last year's report show that calls for service had been declining. Noting that self-initiated calls had been removed from the data which showed only those call which had been initiated by the public. This year's calls for service include all calls for service. Weather initiated by an officer or the public the officer is still tied up on a work assignment and this should be noted to show the true amount of incidents our police officers actually handle.



Arrests and traffic enforcement are not only indicators of the presence of violations, but are also a reflection of the motivation and professionalism of our officer.
